Alzheimer's disease and other dementias steal time and memories from more than three quarters of a million Canadians. We need your help now!


- After the age of 65, 1 in ten Canadians develop dementia.

My Estate Distribution

Your Will does not need to detail every item for distribution in your estate. However, if you wish to give someone a specific item or sum of money, or if there has been a change in your wishes outlined in a previous Will, make your wishes known.

In distributing money, consider dividing it by percentages, rather than in fixed amounts to take into account changes in the size of your estate. For possessions, consider listing some specific items that are valuable or have sentimental meaning, and then designate one individual to receive "the balance of my personal possessions." Please note that giving charities gifts of publicly traded securities and mutual funds through your Will gives your estate significant tax advantages.

My Final Farewell

Everyone, regardless of health status or age, can plan and prepare for their funeral. You can include anything you want in your final farewell. You must complete and share your plan if you want your wishes carried out.

A funeral or memorial generally combines elements of both mourning and celebration. Your family and friends will gather to simultaneously share their sorrow and celebrate your life.

It is common for a close family member to take on the role of memorial or funeral planner. He or she will be asked many questions that you could have easily answered before your passing. Many of the questions asked may leave your family members a bit perplexed. Some may even get emotionally stressed.

Consider that your funeral or memorial service could be an opportunity for you to say a final farewell. And you get to choose how that goodbye is experienced by your family and friends. If you take control of the planning it helps ensure that your wishes are carried out. It also removes a burden from your family and friends at a time of grief and stress.

By reflecting on the following questions, you can help your family members with your final farewell.

Things to consider after the Remembrance Service

Do you want to donate your body? o Yes o No

You might wish to donate your entire body for medical education (also referred to as "anatomical studies") or scientific research, or part of your body for transplant. But even if you wish to donate your entire body, it might be refused — for any number of reasons. If it is your desire to further medical research, find out now if your remains will be accepted and tell your loved ones of your wishes.

Do you prefer cremation or earth burial?

How do you want your physical remains disposed of? Your choices are cremation or earth burial. Decide and make your wishes known to your family. Write it down so there is no misunderstanding. Go a step further and make the arrangements. This is a real plus and will take the financial strain and emotional stress off of your loved ones.

My wishes are:

- o An immediate cremation with no memorial service
- o An immediate cremation, followed by a memorial service on the same day, or later
- o A funeral service with my body present in a casket, followed by cremation
- O An immediate earth burial with a graveside service
- o An immediate earth burial, followed by a memorial service on the same day or later
- A "traditional" funeral service with my embalmed body present in a casket, whether open or closed followed by earth burial.

Would you like a token of remembrance given out at your farewell service? For example, a tree sapling?
Do you want remembrance cards made available, as well as envelopes for family and friends who wish to make memorial donations to your favourite charity? This is a gesture that many may wish to make in order to honour your life. What charity would you like to benefit?



My Memory Bank

The aim of the *Memory Bank* is to capture your favourite memories. You probably won't complete it all in one go, so make a note of the thoughts you have and return to it after a time of reflection.

When you reflect, look at your life as a timeline filled with your unique and distinctive experiences. Your memorable moments may be simple or complex, joyful or sad. Some may have been formative and deposited in the human collective consciousness, like the fall of the Berlin Wall or the moonwalk.

My Outer World

Your favourite memories may be linked to your sense of belonging and relationships, such as with family, friends, teachers, colleagues, neighbours, etc. Or they may be those times of accomplishment, taking a stand for something important, a commitment fulfilled, your quest for continuous learning or to excel in an area of interest.

Your favourite memories may also be linked to travel, culture and world awareness. Did you yearn to travel and see other cultures beyond your borders? Or your fondest and happiest memories may be linked to your five senses, a beautiful image or work of art, a great book that inspired you, a moving piece of music, a favourite scent, the taste of your favourite meal, or the feel of your loved one's hand in yours.
